Today in the History of Psychology (Week 3)

In this assignment, you will be examining the relationship between important historical dates and the current practice of psychology. You will select three dates (the month and day only) of importance to you. Enter these dates into [Today in the History of Psychology](#). Using the worksheet for the assignment, provide a summary of the event (minimum word count 150 words). Then identify and explain three examples of how each event influenced the current practice of psychology (each example minimum word count 150 words).

Contributions to the Current Practice of Psychology (Week 6)

In this assignment, you will select an individual who has made important contributions to the history of psychology. For this assignment, create a PowerPoint that includes a description of the life and work of your selected individual.

The PowerPoint will need to include the following information:

- a) biographical information (2-3 slides)
- b) papers and books authored by the individual (2 slides)
- c) commentary by others about the nature and significance of this individual's work (2-3 slides)
- d) evidence of the person's influence in the current practice of psychology (5 slides)
- e) description of how this individual's work relates to your personal interests in psychology (4 slides)

Communicating on the Forum

- Forums are the heart of the interaction in this course. The more engaged and lively the exchanges, the more interesting and fun the course will be. Only substantive comments will receive credit. Although there is a final posting day/time after which the instructor will grade and provide feedback, you are strongly discouraged from waiting until the due date to contribute your comments/questions on the forum. The purpose of the forums is to actively participate in an on-going discussion about the assigned content.
- "Substantive" means comments that contribute something new and important to the discussion. Thus a message that simply says "I agree", even if wordy and thus, meets the length requirement, is not substantive. A substantive comment contributes a new idea or perspective, a good follow-up question to a point made, offers a response to a question, provides an example or illustration of a key point, points out an inconsistency in an argument, etc.
- As a class, if we run into conflicting view points, we must respect each other as colleagues. Hateful, aggressive, or hurtful comments towards other individuals, students, groups, peoples, and/or societies will not be tolerated.
- Students must post a response to the weekly forums prompt and post the required number of replies to other students – refer to the grading rubric and/or forum instructions for specific expectations on number of replies and word count requirements.
