## Take Courses from a Different Program

- Different subjects entail different learning strategies, and can open your view of the world around you.
- You may just discover a hidden interest! It's never too late to discover a new passion.

Don't be afraid to take a course that is seemingly unrelated to your field of study. If you're in Space Studies, try taking a Philosophy course. 02

## Take Advantage of Your Interests and Strengths

- Taking a course that appeals to your interests or strength can contribute to a better learning experience.
- Consider taking a General Elective course that will build or strengthen a specific skill you already have.

Pursing a business degree? Try taking a communications course (COMM300). Communication courses can help you develop and fine-tune your verbal and nonverbal communication skills.

Add a Certificate or Minor

- Does your degree have other concentration options? You will declare one concentration as part of your program requirements; but, the other concentration options could inspire your General Elective course choices.
